Safety first

Welcome to the fourth newsletter of the school year. I am pleased that we have been able to prepare and send you this newsletter on a regular basis. With so much going on, there is never a shortage of news and information. One purpose of the newsletter is to reduce the volume of separate email communication, so please be sure to read through carefully.

Our theme in this newsletter is safety, as a foundation for student learning and wellbeing. Appropriate too, as we approach <u>UN World Children's Day</u> on 20th November.

COVID hygiene protocols

A reminder that the <u>protocol</u> published by the local authorities states that if your child has been absent because of illness (such as gastroenteritis or fever), a doctor's certificate is required by the school upon their return.

We have been extremely fortunate to have enjoyed an unbroken period of seven weeks of face to face school this term. As a school community, we must continue to adhere to the hygiene protocols in place, so that we are all doing everything we can here at BCA to protect ourselves.

Safeguarding

'Safeguarding' is taken very seriously at BCA, in the context of our legal duty of care for students.

For those unfamiliar with the term, safeguarding means 'measures to protect the health and wellbeing of children and adolescents to live free from abuse, harm, and neglect.' Within the broad area of safeguarding, is the more specific topic of child protection, which may be defined as 'activity that is undertaken to protect specific children and adolescents who are suffering or may potentially suffer from abuse, harm, or neglect.'



Among the safeguarding measures that the school takes are:

- Having policies in place which establish a holistic, comprehensive approach to safeguarding, embracing the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child. These policies include Safer Recruitment practices.
- Clearly defining and communicating the steps our employees, volunteers, visitors, and externally contracted staff, coaches and occasional workers are required to take in order to safeguard and promote the welfare of students.
- Responding promptly and effectively, should abuse or endangerment be observed, suspected, or disclosed.
- Addressing safeguarding topics through the curriculum (e.g. Personal Social and Health Education)

Staff were briefed on safeguarding responsibilities and procedures as part of the preparation days before term began, and this will be followed up by further training during the year. As part of a wide review of school policies, those relating to safeguarding will be updated and further strengthened this year.

Within the home-school partnership, parents clearly play an essential role in safeguarding. As well as keeping open communication with teachers, there is a wealth of resources online for parents looking for guidance on topics including online safety and respectful relationships. As we develop our programmes this year, and in discussion with the parent representatives, we will consider introducing workshops for parents on some of these topics.

The Designated Safeguarding Lead for BCA is the Principal, to whom any concerns regarding a child should be notified.

Medicines in school

Parents must inform the school if students are bringing medication to school, including painkillers or homeopathic remedies. Students must not self-administer any medicine without permission. The school will keep accurate and confidential records of all student medical conditions and required medications.



Evacuation

The school will stage a planned evacuation drill in the week commencing 8 November, as part of the preparations for formal inspection by the Cos de Bombers d'Andorra in the same month.

New staff leadership positions

Congratulations to Mr. Sam Shabolt, BCA Science teacher, who has been appointed BCA Secondary Coordinator, and to Mr. Warren Quintion, BCA English teacher, who has been appointed BCA International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme Coordinator ('DP Coordinator'). Both candidates faced two rounds of interviews, including a rigorous cross-examination by members of our newly formed Student Council. Earlier in the year, of course, Mrs. Alison Williams was appointed as BCA Primary Coordinator, and she has ensured the smooth day-to-day running of Primary, along with her team. These positions of responsibility are central to taking the school to the next level, and achieving its strategic goals.

Staff absence

When a teacher or teaching assistant is absent, another member of staff is assigned to cover. In general, we will only communicate these temporary arrangements to parents if the teacher's absence is for more than three days.
